

Wills, estate inventories, estate sales, and guardian financial reporting are all in the microfilm called WILLS AND INVENTORY. Booklet 18 and 19 covers app. 700 pages of Will Book I and II.

In the wills, I have deleted some of the legal terminology..."Be it remembered in the county of Houston and in the state of Tennessee, I" by using...Also, if the calls for the land area are marks no longer findable "north to the rock pile...w to forked hickory", I have omitted this. If the calls for the land area include a person's line, creek, road, etc., it is listed.

A personal inventory and sale is listed completely including name of item, buyer, and amount paid. Three store inventories are shortened but all buyers are listed and all items are listed at least once: Example: the E.D.Boone store took two days to sell the contents and there are 60 pages of entries (20 pr. of suspenders were sold to 20 buyers). You may find an item listed in the inventory that is still in the family. There will be items sold that you do not know what they are-example: steelyards are a type of balance scale.

The TABLE OF CONTENTS at the beginning is listed in the order it is listed in the Will Book with the symbol (W) for will (I) for inventory and (G) guardian report. These are also listed on the index at the end in alphabetical order. There is no date on some of these items so you will have to estimate by using the date of the item before and the item after.

INDEX of buyers, people who owed the estate money, witnesses to the documents, administrators, are listed by surname only in the index and a (\*) is placed by the surname if the surname has more than ten (10) entries

Hopefully, this will allow some of you to put more "meat" on an ancestor's skeleton. As I have suggested to several of you, if you don't like, for some reason, your immediate ancestor, go back a few generations and you may find some you do like. The following may be appropriate for booklet 18 and 19.

When you peer into the branches  
of your new-found family tree,

as they're looking back at thee.

I, GEORGE SLAUGHTER, do make and publish...First, I direct that my funeral expenses and all of my debts be paid...Secondly, I will that all my personal property of every kind... go to my sister TABITHA SLAUGHTER in case she is my survivor...I also will that my sister TABITHA SLAUGHTER have all of my tract of land on which I now live situated in Houston Co, Tenn., Civil Dist. No. 5 and bounded on the north by Hooper, on the south by J.B.Boone, on the east by L.R.Hooper and on the west by Jesse Weaver & Uffelman, to have same during her lifetime and to live on the rents...if sufficient...if not to sell said land or so much as may be necessary to support her...at her death, whatever portion may remain undisposed of, I direct and will that said remainder be equally divided between ADA AVERITT, my granddaughter, and WILLIAM AVERITT, her father...March 1881

I, TURN E. MOORE of my own free will...my last will and request as follows: 1st-I will to my wife, SUSAN MOORE, the farm on which I now live also the land known as the Oily Bottom and that part of the West land lying between my home farm and the land that Nancy A Adams' heirs own. I further will that my wife SUSAN MOORE have all the farming utensils and stock on hand at my death except the two mules and they are to be sold and the money put out at interest and she is to have the interest of said money to use as she may please and if necessary, she may use the principal. I further will that at my death that my interest in the farm on Yellow Creek known as the "Ann Nesbitt farm", my interest in the farm of Elk Creek known as the "Ellis farm" and a tract of land in West's old coaling containing one hundred and sixty six acres be sold and the money put out at interest and should my wife SUSAN MOORE need the interest to support herself and EVALINE MOORE and MOLLIE MITCHELL, so long as they remain with her, she may use the same.

I further will that so long as my wife SUSAN MOORE may live and so long as J.A.HALLIBURTON and wife may desire to live on my home farm that he or wife may have the house they now live in free of charge but he or she must pay a reasonable rent for all the land he or she may cultivate and for the repairing of the farm and getting wood for my wife SUSAN MOORE and tending to the stock, he, J.A.HALLIBURTON, is to have a reasonable compensation.

I further will that my home farm including the Oily Bottom and strip of the West land between my home farm and the land belonging to Nancy A Adams heirs be divided as follows: Beginning at a cross fence on the west side of Guicoes Creek...then with right hand fork to the back line...I will that EVALINE MOORE and bodily heirs, MISSOURI HALLIBURTON and bodily heirs have these two farms if they want them at my wife SUSAN MOORE'S death and my death, said farms to be valued by three disinterested men. I further will that at my death and SUSAN MOORE'S death, that first of all I want all of my just debts be paid and all of my personal property sold on a credit of 12 months and further will that MOLLIE H. MITCHELL have a good horse, bridle and saddle and one hundred dollars in money and that all the moneys arising from the sale of lands or personal property be equally divided between all my children I further appoint G.R.Moore and M.H.Moore, my two sons, executors...March 28, 1883

I, Rebecca Hicks, in feeble bodily health but sound memory...after my funeral expenses have been paid, all my personal property, consisting at the present time entirely of cash notes, be converted into cash and when so converted, I give and bequeath to my daughter MARY E. SKELTON one-half thereof to be used as she thinks proper...for the support of herself and her children...after her death, to her children. One-fourth of said fund, I bequeath to my son JONES HICKS, and the remaining one-fourth of the same to my son EDWARD D. HICKS I give...to my daughter MARY E. SKELTON...All of my bedding and furniture, all of my personal paraphernalia-trunks, books, etc...It is my will that NANCY ALIHEA NEBLETT and JACK WEST, having already received through their parents their full share of my estate, shall have nothing under this will...I nominate and appoint L.L.Skelton, Executor...July 26, 1887

I, ANN FISER, do make and publish...First, I desire that my funeral expenses and all of my debts be paid...Secondly, I give and bequeath to my husband J.T.FISER one-half of the tract of land I now live on...on the upper half which is to include the buildings during his natural life and then to be equally divided between OSCAR UCLID ROBERSON and ELMEDA GUIN... Thirdly, I give and bequeath to OSCAR UCLID ROBERSON and ELMEDA GUIN the other half of the lands I now live on to be equally divided between them. Fourthly, I give and bequeath to OSCAR UCLID ROBERSON one bed and bedstead and clothing and one horse, bridle and saddle, one cow and calf. Fifthly, I give and bequeath to ELMEDA GUIN, one bed and bedstead and bed clothing, one horse, bridle and saddle, and one cow and calf. And I hereby direct and request that my executor give the two above named children a classical education out of the rents or profits arising out of their part of said lands.

I further direct that all the household furniture that I may die possessed of be equally divided between my husband, J.T.FISER, OSCAR UCLID ROBERSON and ELMEDA GUIN. I further direct that if either of the above mentioned children should die before it becomes of age the one living is to have the undivided interest of the deceased one. I further direct that the above mentioned children shall have the place I now live on together with my said husband so long as the said children are properly cared for. Lastly, I do hereby nominate and appoint my husband J.T. Fiser my executor...Feb., 15th 1878

I, J.A.Duffel, do make and publish...First, I direct that my funeral expenses and all of my debts be paid, except a note in favor of ALFRED DUFFEL, my son, as soon after my death as possible...Secondly, I direct that my farm and all the farming implements there, two mules and wagon, one road mare, two cows and calves, fifteen head of hogs, all the poultry all the household and kitchen furniture and, if on hand, 75 barrels of corn, 50 bushels of wheat, a sufficient amount of hay, cats or other provided for the stock on hand for 12 months. One thousand pounds of bacon and fifty pounds of lard shall remain in the hands of and under the control of my three children: E.E.DUFFEL, JESSEE L. DUFFEL and W.L.DUFFEL AND HAVING GIVEN ALL OF MY CHILDREN (except Ben) a good horse and my daughters each a bed and bedding, I direct that in case any accident happens to the colts before they become serviceable belonging to either of my daughters E.E.DUFFEL and JESSEE L. DUFFEL, another will be set apart to replace the same and that my daughter JESSEE L. DUFFEL shall have a bed and bedding in like manner as the others.

I further direct that when my son W.L.DUFFEL marries or comes of age, he shall have a good horse provided that should my son, W.L.DUFFEL, marry before he comes of age, his interest in the above described property (except the horse) shall cease. Provided further that in case of the marriage of either of my daughters, E.E.DUFFEL or JESSEE L. DUFFEL, her interest in the above described property shall cease. I do further direct that when my youngest child, W.L.DUFFEL, comes of age which will be on the 23 day of May 1891, then the above described property shall be sold to the highest bidder and after paying the note in full to ALF DUFFEL, above mentioned, with the accrued interest, the remaining proceeds shall be equally divided between all of my heirs. Lastly, I do hereby nominate... my son J.A.DUFFEL my executor...July 1883
